



Kendrick "Kendy" Anne Haack-Lowry

April 3, 1960 - March 5, 2026

Kendrick "Kendy" Anne Haack-Lowry passed away after a courageous battle with cancer on March 5th, 2026. She was born on April 3, 1960, in Grimsby Beach, Ontario, Canada, to Patty Verner and Edward Haack.

At the age of six, Kendy moved with her family to Detroit, Michigan. She was an adventurous child who loved traveling and exploring new places. She graduated from Our Lady of Mercy High School in Farmington, Michigan, and went on to attend the David Pressley School of Cosmetology in Royal Oak.

With a passion for the beauty industry and that same adventurous spirit, Kendy continued her education in Paris, France, at the Christian Chauveau Cours Privé de Maquillage Artistique, where she earned her degree in May 1982. That same summer, she moved to New York City to begin her career as a freelance makeup artist. She went on to become Head Makeup Artist for PBS/WNET Channel 13, working on productions including The MacNeil/Lehrer NewsHour. During her career, she also worked with Ringo Starr on the children's television show Shining Time Station.

Kendy met her husband, Steve, in April 1977, and they were married seven years later. The couple eventually settled in Seattle, Washington, where they welcomed their only child, Shaw St. Clair Lowry, on a very special Christmas Day. Kendy devoted many years to raising Shaw and helping develop the

family's property in Snohomish.

In addition to being a devoted mother, Kendy was a talented cook. She later pursued this passion by attending the Le Cordon Bleu Institute of Culinary Arts in Seattle, earning her degree in 2010. She worked alongside Russell Lowell at Russell's in Bothell and Russell Dean Lowell Catering for several years.

In 2016, Kendy and Steve moved to Bellingham, Washington, where she began working for the Bellingham School District. She especially enjoyed her time at the Central Kitchen at Bellingham High School.

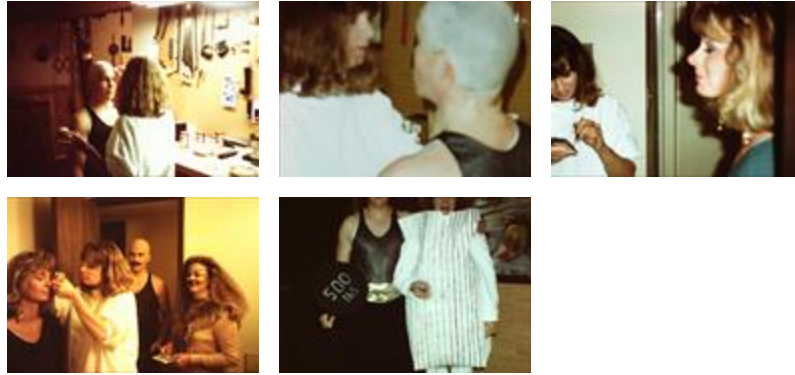

Not long after getting topped up with popcorn, Kendy spoke about the significant insulation qualities of the popular snack. No make-up needed for rosy cheeks. As always, Kendy brought great food – this Halloween evening, a salty snack.

Everything Kendy touched seemed to turn into a magazine cover – A flower arrangement, a platter of hors d’oeuvres, a sliced apple, a home, a social gathering. What could easily be mundane was magically turned into exquisite richness.

Being with Kendy was to be part of a live palette being created right before your eyes.

She was a make-up artist in NYC at the time. “ I am so grateful to have had Kendy as a friend. She influenced my life in ways I could never have imagined. I miss her so much.

Here’s a little story about our friendship:

Kendy and I met in 1974 when we were 14-year-old freshmen at the All-girl Our Lady of Mercy High School in Farmington Hills, MI.

I never imagined how my new friend would so profoundly impact my life – all the way from our teen years to our 60s.

Kendy had the unique ability to see life from a different perspective, and she enjoyed life on a level few can. And that’s where our story began.

For some context, I am the fifth out of six children and was living with my big Irish/French/Catholic family in Detroit, Michigan. Kendy and I didn’t have a lot in common with the get-go, yet I delighted in learning from her world and I think she did the same from mine.

There was a lot of pandemonium at our house, where Kendy’s house was like a palace to me – full of art and light and music – and quiet! One time, while visiting us, she marveled about a big pot of spaghetti on the stove – It just another dinner for the eight of us.

Here are some of my wonderful memories -

Lunch hours we spent sitting on the tennis courts in high school.

Kendy told me about a trip to Morocco she took with her dad, Wray. Her details were fascinating and I could see her visiting the bazaars there. I never imagined anyone going to such an exotic place! This was a friend I knew was special.

When we turned old enough (not!), we listened to Neil Diamond at her house while we were dressing up to go to the disco. I knew *no one* our age who listened to his music, but it was so Kendy. Today, whenever I hear a Neil Diamond song, I think of her.

Also in the 70s and 80s, we would sometimes venture to “renaissance type” establishments in downtown Detroit to engage in the city’s rebirth or listen to her mother perform at a piano bar there. In 1977, a photo of her “crew cut” (attached) was displayed on the front page of *The Detroit News* as the new, bold way to style your hair. I remember sitting at our kitchen table when my dad pointed it out. I swear I was so impressed and delighted that she was my independent friend.

She always prioritized an animal's well-being – sometimes above humans, which she readily admitted 😊 Her Siamese cat, Zerbo, lived at my mom and dad's house while she lived in Paris – which was hilarious since my mom was a cat-hater – but oh, no – not Zerbo – Beverly (mom) LOVED Zerbo. (I think Zerbo lived until she was 23 or something).

Paris was an experience like no other. When I arrived in the spring of 1980, off the plane and train in Belgium, Kendy met me there and made me spin around (I was a sophomore in college and had gained the freshman “15”) – she exclaimed, “wow, Sheila, you really have filled out!”. (I forgave her for that...)

Shopping for food in Paris, basic things became gourmet around Kendy. A baguette, mayonnaise and a tomato and, VOILA! You have a delicious dinner. Kendy taught me how good basic food like this could taste.

Another time, she stole an oyster from a St. Germain restaurant's outdoor stand. She walked around with it for a time trying to figure out how she would open it but finally decided she would go back to the same restaurant and ask them to open it for her while I stood by, wide-eyed. (I think they did).

Attached is a picture of us from those days in western Europe. When Kendy spoke French, it was unique – but I'll be darned -- everyone understood it. Her lilting, melodious voice, combined with the French language, was a “patois” all its own.

During my college years, we would drive up to Ferris State on occasion to visit Steve and his fraternity brothers. On one of these trips, I trusted Kendy to drive, blasting music from her Pinto during a blinding snowstorm – and we were fine, until we weren't – stuck in the median in the dark, with snow up to our windows. And then, because Kendy was a magician and she sweet-talked the State Patrol, we were out of that scary situation and on our way to Big Rapids.

In 2022, after a long period where we lost touch, we reconnected. I was so happy! Since Bill and I had just moved to Seattle, we were able to be together often! We fell into place as long-time friends, immediately. On one excursion, we went to the home and garden show, and I learned about her vast knowledge of fauna and foliage.

That day, she advised me that a certain broom was the best one to buy – so I did. Every time I pick it up, this Besom broom brings me right back to that day.

*Recently, I sent her a picture of oranges with shredded mint. I thanked her for giving me this idea to enjoy oranges this way. She served them this way at brunch at their house last year. She said, “Such a pretty picture”. That was Kendy – never taking credit for anything, ever. She was always hoping that *you* were enjoying life. She loved her son Shaw so much and talked about him every single time we spoke. She was a fiercely proud mama and wanted the best for him. And her love for Steve was always there for everyone to see – what a beautiful example of true devotion. Kendy helped me see the world in a way that I never would have imagined. What a gift she was to me.*

I miss you now and forever, Kendy. Until we meet again.

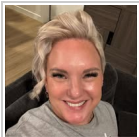

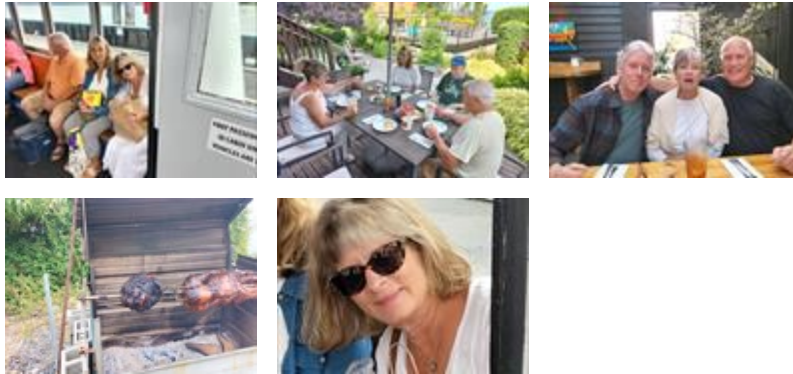
