When she retired as an operator from the phone company, they retired her connector too, the old style plug that was used to join calls, and gave it to her. She kept it on a key chain for many years, and later in her sewing things. She also worked at Pynor's Market which is now called Greene's Corner, and at the Parkade.

Mildred's kid's remember how hard she worked, never complaining, and how she would do without so they would be spoiled. She repeated this pattern with her grandkids. She loved her family fiercely, intensely, and they love her back. It was easy to see how much she loved them by the look on her face when one of them walked in the room. She will be missed.
